He and John Lovely, MMR®, along with a great team of Arizona Division members, hosted a fantastic convention. Now they can all take a deep breath and relax with the satisfaction of a job well done.

The PSR Regional Convention starts, at least for some of us, with the annual Board of Director's meeting on Wednesday afternoon. Our special guest was Western Region Director Mike Mackey, MMR®. The NMRA National organization tries to send a representative to every Regional convention if possible. It was great to have Mike on board with us.

The Board of Directors meeting was productive. The final draft of the Division bylaws, which were revised to align with the region bylaws, were approved, and will now be voted on by each Division's membership. My thanks to Don Fowler, MMR®, Bruce Petrarca, MMR® and our Division Directors for their efforts in making this happen. The Board also approved the creation of a Regional Zoom account so the leadership is not dependent on any Division's Zoom capability. We will help new members settle in and direct them to their Division leadership, website, events, and answer any questions. Vice President Gary Butts, MMR®, has graciously volunteered to take on this role.

In other business, I am pleased to announce that Karie Neely has agreed to take on the non-rail chair on the board. Karie is already on the SurfLiner 2024 National Convention committee as hotel liaison, and I'm sure she will do a great job on the Regional Board as well. Welcome aboard Karie!

Wednesday night the PSR leadership (Vice President Gary Butts, MMR®, CFO/Treasurer Joel Morse, First Lady of the Region Mona Raymer and myself) got a chance to exercise our biceps as we all scooped cones and cups at the ice cream social. Even though the evening was cool, it didn't seem to slow down the line for the frozen treats. It was a great chance for us "scoopers" to meet and greet the members. There was also an inspired game involving a large jigsaw puzzle that got everybody circulating.

Thursday morning brought the Hobo Breakfast, hosted by Don Fowler, MMR®, followed by the General Membership Meeting. Both were well attended. It is at the General Membership Meeting that the newly elected Division Directors are introduced. 2 incumbents will continue as Directors: Harold Helland, MMR® in Cajon Division and Vic Cavalli in L.A. Division. Our 2 new Directors are Chris Thompson in Arizona Division and Tim Foote in San Diego Division. Because the convention date was moved up to June rather than the typical September timeframe, the new Directors will be installed at a Zoom meeting on September 15th. This will allow the current Directors to serve their complete 2 year terms.

Once all the business had been conducted, it was on to more fun! There were all the activities you have come to expect from a PSR Regional convention. The Arizona team arranged a full set of great clinics for Thursday and Friday and layout tours from Wednesday through Sunday. There was an amazing Hobo Auction on Thursday night, with the most items I can ever remember being offered.

The star of the show was the Grand Canyon Railway. On Friday morning we had exclusive access to the shops. What a treat! The Grand Canyon Railway crew gave a basic safety orientation and then gave us free rein to wander the shop area. We were able to climb up into the cab of the GCR 4960 Mikado, which would lead our train the following day, for a photo op. Then it was over to one of the FP40 diesels in the shed for a stem to stern tour.

Saturday morning arrived early and it was off to the station in Williams to greet our train to the rim of the Grand Canyon. Mona and I had accommodations in

We then moved on to the awards portion of the banquet. This is where we recognize the efforts of the modelers who brought entries to the Celebration of Models/Contest Room. The last part of the ceremony is the PSR Member of the Year Awards. Every year, one member from each Division and one from the entire region are recognized for their contributions to the organization. This part of the banquet is a real highlight for me. The recipients of these awards are known only to the Division Directors, (and they only know the recipient for their own Division), the Vice President (who arranged for the manufacture of the metal plaques attached to each award), and myself. I hope to see you at one of our Region or Division events soon.



Awards Program

Well, the 2023 PSR Convention the Grand Canyon Special is now just a memory. If you missed it, you missed a lot of fun and good fellowship. Entries into the show room were light with only ten entries for Merit Evaluation. All ten where nicely done and eight of them did earn a Merit Award. I am sure Mike Allee will have a full Show Room report in his report.

At the convention several issues were discussed, first being 3D printing and how it is judged. If you prepare the CAD drawings and it is printed without any changes to the drawing then it will qualify for scratchbuilt. But it will be evaluated like any other scratch-built model in Construction, Detail, Conformity, Paint & Lettering, and Scratchbuilt. So, be sure to do your write up as if it was scratchbuilt to get the maximum points.

Next, we had some heated discussions on Structures and Structures on a diorama and just what categories they belong in and how to evaluate them. Here is the basic outcome, if it is just a structure not on a base it

can be entered into the structures category. If it is a structure on a base with landscape and other items it must be entered into Diorama. The reason for this is the landscape around the structure could give you an advantage over just a structure, more information will be forthcoming on this.

Lastly, when you submit work for an AP Certificate you MUST include ALL pages of the SOQ even if it is just a list of things that must be done, example is page two of the Dispatcher which is just a list of the various jobs, we need that submitted along with the rest of the SOQ. Also be sure to fill out everything on the SOQ, if items are not complete the SOQ will be returned to you. This includes all information including verification from your Division AP Manager who verifies you have met all the requirements. I simply do not have the time to look up your address, NMRA Number, etc. My job is to verify you have done all the work and completely filled out the paperwork.

Hello to all the PSR members from the NMRA Arizona Division.

On March 11, our spring meet was held in Scottsdale. Our summer meet was not held due to the June 2023 convention in Flagstaff, but we will hold a fall meet, probably in Tucson. We are continuing our program of monthly Division Zoom calls the third Saturday of each month.

The Grand Canyon Special PSR Convention was held in Flagstaff, AZ on June 7-11, 2023, and I believe all attendees thoroughly enjoyed the activities; convention clinics, ice cream social, swap meet and the charter train trip on the Grand Canyon Railway. The convention headquarters, Drury Inn and Suites, provided excellent meeting rooms for our clinics. The adjacent High Country Convention center hosted large events, such as the Hobo Auction, swap meet and the closing banquet. Attendance at the convention was 172 with 214 passengers aboard the Grand Canyon Railway charter train trip. Everyone who attended the convention was a special guest, but we want to recognize the banquet speaker, Dale Angell, plus Shotgun Tom Kelly and NMRA Western District Director Mike Mackey.

The clinics covered a broad range of topics. Modeling topics included presentations of scenery landscape techniques, layout lighting using LED's, scratch-building structures, etc. Also, a number of clinics were about the history of Flagstaff and the logging industry, traveling the Canadian Rocky Mountaineer, history of the Harvey Girls, etc. An off-site highlight was the shop tour of the Grand Canyon Railway in Williams on Friday morning. After a safety briefing by the shop foreman, we were allowed to walk through the shops to see repair work in progress on various pieces of equipment, including locomotive #29 plus private car Kansas was open to view. Steam locomotive #4960 was fired up in preparation for the charter trip on Saturday morning and available to climb into the cab.

Certainly, a highlight of the convention was the charter train trip on Saturday morning behind steam locomotive #4960. The train consisted of four passenger cars of different classes plus a café car. Leaving Williams at 8:30 am heading north, the landscape is generally rolling hills with scrub oak and juniper pines scattered across the hills. Nearing the south rim of the Grand Canyon, the tracks go through extensive forests of Ponderosa Pines with a significant uphill grade. Passengers in the open window Pullman coach could certainly hear #4960 laboring. In fact, as we neared Grand Canyon Village, our train stalled on a sharp right-hand curve into the Village. The engineer reversed and backed the train about a mile and made a successful second run up the hill and sharp curve. We blasted into the Village, to the awe and amazement of the many park visitors. During our 2 ½ hour layover at the Grand Canyon Village, we witnessed amazing views of the Grand Canyon plus the historic Hopi House, Kolb Bros Studio and El Tovar Hotel. In the afternoon return trip to Williams, we were treated to three photo run-by's of our train.

Saturday night was the closing banquet with special speaker Dale Angell, aka "The Toy Man". Contest room awards and Division member awards were presented. Sunday morning featured layout tours and the trip home.

Many thanks to everyone who worked diligently over the past year to plan and organize the convention. Also, a special thanks to the two convention committee chairs, Jess Poole and John Lovely.

PACIFIC SOUTHWEST REGION 37 TREASURERS SUMMER 2023 DISPATCH REPORT

SUMMARY:

During the period March 1, 2023, through May 31, 2023, there were several PSR financial transactions, both deposits and credits.

On the Credit Side, these included distribution of Division Membership Rebates, purchase of awards, storage locker rental fees and payment of CA State Annual Filing Fees.

On the deposit side, the Region received Division Membership Rebates, \$90.54 for the Hobo Account from the San Diego Division for the Back on Track Regional Convention, and \$21.04 from our participation in the Amazon Smile program (which has been discontinued by Amazon).

The May 31, 2023, Bank Statement indicates that the Region has \$22,586.23 in the Region Checking Account.

Note that the PSR loaned \$10,000 in "seed money" to the 2024 Convention Committee.

CONTEST REPORT GRAND CANYON EXPRESS PACIFIC SOUTHWEST REGION CONVENTION

There are two ways in which o ne can enter an item in the Contest Room: 1) As an item to be evaluated, using NMRA guidelines, in the effort to receive a Merit Award. 2) As an item entered into "Display" not seeking a Merit Award.

A Merit Award is one step in earning the title of Master Model Railroader (MMR®). An item to be evaluated is automatically entered into "Popular Choice". "Popular Choice", attendees vote on all items presented. "Best of Show" can only be awarded to an evaluated item and all models in the particular category are moved up one placement position.

Unfortunately the number of items entered for evaluation were limited with only ten being submitted. Even so eight of the models received a merit award. There were twenty-five items submitted for Display.












