

Former PSR President Chaparro Takes on New Roles

resident Ed Hall has appointed Bob Chaparro to the new volunteer position of PSR Layout Coordinator. In this role, Bob will maintain a database of model railroad club, module and individual home layouts located within the PSR and provide region, division and convention staff with updated copies of the database for official PSR planning and activities. The database will include listings for both NMRA and non-NMRA members. He will also assist convention layout coordinators as requested and provide club and module groups with PSR publicity items. The database information will not be provided for commercial purposes nor to non-PSR members. Bob has requested that information on home layouts, clubs and module groups be sent to him at psrpom239@cox.net or (949) 770-5158.

President Hall has also appointed Bob to the position of Convention Promotion Committee Chairman. According to the PSR Manual Of Operations, the Convention Promotion Committee shall consist of five members and the Contest Chairman, ex-officio. The President shall appoint the Chairman and the Chairman shall appoint four members of the Committee. The duties


of the Convention Committee shall be to accept (in accordance with **Section 9, Item 3 of the Manual - see below**) written bids from prospective Convention Hosts. The Committee shall screen the bids for suitability of facilities and the ability to handle a convention and shall deliver all approved bids to the President.

- **3. Bids:** The Convention Committee should maintain a continuing search for convention sites.
- a) A logical place to develop bids is through the Division Board Members. The Chairman should work well in advance of need to contact these men for information which will yield a valid bid.
- **b)** In some cases the Division organization will sponsor a bid in the name of the Division.
- **c)** There are also great possibilities for valid bids from groups. which may or may not, be a Club Organization.
- **d)** Valid bids may come from any of the above groups for a convention which may be held in a geographical location which is not the "home town" of the group.
- **e)** Experience has shown that a convention can be hosted at a site chosen solely for location.

- **f)** The schedule of conventions should serve the membership population be a logical rotation from east to west in the Region.
- g) The Chairman and his committee should make available all possible information regarding future bids and convention needs to bidders to assist them in making a knowledgeable bid. A summary of the requirements is available from the Convention Committee Chairman.
- **h)** A bid must be in the hands of the President four (4) weeks before the meeting at which the selection will be made.
- i) The PSR Convention Committee shall screen all bids and may make recommendations to the Board of Directors.







Insights

his 4th Quarter issue of the *PSR Dispotch* brings to a close a very successful year for the PSR Education Department. Our Region received many "well done" congratulatory messages for our support at the recent Board of Trustee meeting. Our mid-year report reflected our diligence and certainly demonstrated the success that can be achieved through cooperative effort. I have every confidence our year-end final report will be even greater and more comprehensive.

At the mid-year PSR Board of Directors' meeting I presented a preview of some of the changes that are in the works Nationally and forthcoming. This preview is repeated here for your information.

JUNIOR COLLEGE PROGRAM

Rich Coleman, National Education Director, is working to restructure the Junior College Program (JCP). He hopes the changes will help boost attendance that has been falling short of expectations.

Starting at the National Convention next year he is proposing to cut back the time the JCP is run during the convention to only one day. He is also proposing to relocate the JCP stations closer to a specific manufacturer. Currently the JCP stations are located in an area located away from the Trade Show and manufacturers have to leave their booths to participate in the program. He feels having the stations closer to the participating manufacturers will allow them to work at the JCP station without having to be away from their booths.

What is needed most are volunteers who would enjoy working with our youth at this level and also someone to take over the reins of the JCP. Rutger Friberg started it and has done a great job in its growth, however he is from Sweden and finds it difficult to set up sessions and do the things necessary from such a distance. In addition Rutger has just been named to head the Technical Department further engulfing his time.

NEW CLINIC PROGRAM

A new clinic program called the NMRA Core Skills



Clinic Program is now being developed. The basic idea behind its development is to have a "standard" syllabus for each clinic, outlining the basic concepts that should be covered. Presenters would continue to use their own models or projects to illustrate the points involved, however they would also have a syllabus of "standard" information that is to be covered in each of the various types of clinics.

Rich is currently working on the development of the materials for each individual type of clinics in the program.

LEGOS IN THE NMRA?

Have you seen some of the Lego train layouts now being displayed at train shows? They are unquestionably popular and some of the pictures on their web site are absolutely amazing. It really demonstrates some of the remarkable modeling being done with Lego. If you haven't seen it, you are encouraged and invited to visit www.brickshelf.com to view their gallery on trains.

Recently a group of Lego train modelers inquired about what kind of a niche might be created in the NMRA for Lego train modelers. I personally found this bit of information fascinating and very interesting. I had heard of Lego Land and such but never experienced seeing the detail and interior lighting of Lego modeling.

OTHER NEWS

The NMRA Board of Trustees adopted a new long-range plan for the NMRA at its annual meeting in Ft. Lauderdale. One of the recommended items in the plan calls for the restructuring of the NMRA Board of Trustees. Under consideration is a reduction in the number of Trustees from seventeen (currently one from each Region) to 7 to 9 to make the Board more effective. Such a change will impact all areas of the NMRA and it is hoped this impact produces positive results once all the details are ironed out. We will keep a watchful eye on how all this plays out and affects the Education Department.

FINAL THOUGHTS

A gentle reminder to all Division Education Chairs to please send your year-end report to me by January 20, 2003. Division reports should cover the period of July 1, 2002 to December 31, 2002. Here's hoping all of you enjoy a very happy holiday season!

into this resource of talented people will make being a part of the PSR a great experience, one that many might like to join.

Another change involves having the Division Directors participate in communicating and exchanging information. I have asked for a monthly dialogue from the Division Directors every month. I believe with only two PSR Board meetings per year, there is not enough communication. It is also my plan to attend at least one meet in each Division per year.

Now onto the financial part. Due to a lower membership number we are faced with a lower dollar amount coming into the PSR. Throughout the year our spending is about the same as years past but with the lower membership numbers and constantly rising costs, there is not enough money coming in to keep our budget in balance. As with the Divisions, the largest expense of the budget is the newsletters and, in our case, the *PSR Dispatch*.

At the recent PSR Board of Directors meeting several worthwhile ideas and suggestions were proposed to offset this expense. Of heavy concentration will be to get some advertising in the *PSR Dispotch*. I am proposing to establish a special committee to assist in this area. Other ideas, such as discontinuing courtesy "comp" issues to businesses and inviting the PSR membership with Internet access to volunteer to read their issue online, are also being pursued.

One more thing before I go bandage my typing fingers. Our Historian, **Bob Faley**, has started a collection of past year's convention cars for an exhibit display at our Regional functions. He is also collecting final convention reports to be kept in the PSR archives. I am very happy this is being done and think this provides continuity and is very important. Someday in the future members may look back at these articles and see into the PSR past.

I am very excited about the future of the PSR and anxious to see the results of some of the new things we will be doing. Have a great holidays everyone!

It was chartered to provide services to NMRA members on the West Coast whose needs could not be easily met by a national organization, which at that time was largely based in the Midwest. This was the embryo that thirtynine years later. in 1982. spawned the Pacific Southwest Region as we know it today.

Model Railroading Hints, Tips and Ideas

ne of the best things about the hobby of model railroading is the willingness of most modellers to freely share their knowledge with others. Previously, this sharing was limited to things like clubs, conventions and standing around at the local hobby shop. But today we have the World Wide Web, and a number of modellers around the world have posted things they've learned about model railroading on web sites for everyone to see. Through this column I will share some of the tips and hints I've found with you, and give you addresses so you can check out the sites for yourself. One caveat: Although I have no reason to believe that these hints and tips won't work for you, I haven't personally tried them all — so don't blame me if your new Kato SD40 blows up!

INDUSTRIES FOR YOUR MODEL RAILROAD

You've got all those freight cars on your layout—now what industries should they be switched to? That's what **Michael Fischer** talks about on his web site, found at www.naisp.net/users/mfischer/m_train4.htm#industry.

What are the best industries for your model railroad? That's a question that interests me as I develop industries on my layout. I've decided that the best industries are those that offer the greatest variety in car loadings—not necessarily the ones that generate the most traffic. Examples of these kinds of industries include (in no particular order):

Interchange Track. This is the ultimate "industry," as you can put any kind of car at all as an inbound or outbound, empty or loaded.

Car Float or Car Ferry. Like an interchange track, a car ferry gives the same variety in car loadings, plus the operating challenge of getting the cars on and off without messing up the boat's schedule.

Car Cleaning Facility. Almost every car needs to be cleaned out sometime. Boxcars get swept out outside; tank cars and covered hoppers get more elaborate treatment indoors.

Car Repair Shop. Class One railroads maintain huge shops for their own cars. But small car repair shops will take any private-owner car, from box cars to tank cars to auto racks.

Rip Track. The rip track is where light car repairs are made. It is usually located in a yard. This is another "industry" where any car type will be appropriate, and it needs no more scenery than one track with tools and rusty parts scattered nearby.

Team Track. Almost any type of car can be spotted here. Trucks can drive right up to the doors of a box car; if a conveyor and pit are included, covered hoppers can also be unloaded. Place a Walthers' auto unloading ramp at the end of the track and you also spot autoracks there.

Brewery. Covered hoppers filled with grain go in, and insulated box cars of beer go out.

Meat Packing Plant. Stock cars go in; reefers of meat, boxcars of hides and tank cars of by-products come out.

Auto Plant. Going in are box cars of all sizes, gondolas of coiled steel, and tank cars of lubricants and gasoline. Going out—autos, of course, in autoracks.

Paper Mill. Going in are bulkhead flats of pulpwood, wood-chip cars, assorted tank cars full of chemicals, and kaolin in tank cars and covered hoppers. Boxcars of paper products go out.

PAPER SIGNS, VINES TO HIDE CORNERS AND CHEAP & EASY CURTAINS

The next set of tips come from a web site operated by Terry Callahan at www.terrycallahan.com/railroad/workshop.htm.

Paper Signs. The fabulous Franklin and South Manchester of George Sellios has more paper signs than you can count. Where does he get his signs? Well, George is always on the lookout for old magazines from which he cuts classic advertising. I have found some current catalogs to be of some use (the ones that sell the reproduction signs for Coke and Pepsi). First cut the sign from the catalog oversize (leave extra material around the edges). Next, trim the excess with a new No. 11 blade. After it is trimmed, flip it over and very carefully sand the edges. After sanding, dilute some white glue 50/50 with "wet" water (water with a few drops of dish soap), apply a very thin layer of glue to the back of the sign and then place it on the building. Let the sign dry completely (overnight). After it is dry, weather the sign with white chalk dust to make it look like it is faded. You can also lightly sand the face of the sign with some very fine sandpaper so it looks like it is old and torn.

Vines to Hide Your Corners. No matter how hard you try, no matter how careful you are in constructing structures, plastic or wood, sometimes you just can't get the corner just right. The seam will show because the plastic or wood is warped and a huge crack appears at the corner. A time honored cure to this problem is to add ground foam vines held in place with full strength white glue. Apply the glue along the corner seam starting at the top, working your way down to the bottom. Continue to apply the glue along the bottom of the building, trying to visualize how the real thing would grow along the bottom and up the corner. Sprinkle on some ground foam (e.g. from Woodland Scenics). The

ground foam that falls on the glue will stick, and the rest you can pour off into a container. Let dry and-presto! the crack is gone.

Easy and Cheap Window Curtains. Windows on houses look pretty vacant without some kind of curtains. One way to make curtains is by using the insides of business envelopes (the type that are designed to make it hard to see through). They come in a wide variety of patterns, and the price is right.




