That's all for now, see you at the next stop. 📰

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



Arizona Express 2003 September 11 - 14, 2003 — Phoenix, Arizona



I would encourage those who are interested in judging in the contests to contact me as early as possible. Now to judging? If you are interested, we'll place you with an experienced judge. It consisted of a crane and associated car with a boom to lay new and/or replace old rail. Allen's model also won the Testor's Finish award. Allen had to overcome a great deal of adversity. His model was badly damaged coming through customs and required extensive repairs in his hotel room before presenting it in the contest room.



My HO scale GN 50' express refrigerator car received the "Gold Award" for the "Best of Show" model. The car was made up of 1,451 separate parts. My ALCO GN RS-1 loco also placed third in the "Diesel and Other" category.

And there are many hobby shops available if you run out of things to do and have an urge to enhance the Arizona economy.

Not to be left out, the Railettes have a tour to a chocolate factory (Thursday) and trip to a mall (with free coupons on Friday) in addition to the traditional luncheon (Saturday). There will be lots of time for getting re-acquainted with friends and developing new ones.

A new feature this year will be a Chinese Auction. If you have not attended one of these before, it is quite entertaining. This will be held Thursday evening. Locomotive kits, brass cars and lots of other items, including items for the non-rails, have already been placed in the auction. See page 11 for more information on this unique event. There are a few items that we hope you will pay particular attention to within this *Arigona Express 2003* PSR Convention special section. First is the Modeling with the Masters clinics. <u>If you wish to participate in these</u> <u>clinics (one or more) you must sign-up in advance and pay</u> <u>the clinic fee.</u> You will receive further instructions by mail after registering. For these clinics to actually take place there is a requirement that there be at least 20 registrants for each to cover the cost of the materials. You will build something in each clinic that you will be able to take with you when you return home.

Second, there is a rare opportunity to participate in an operating session at the layout of Jim Knollmiller. The first 20 people who submit a request to participate in the operating session will do so. You must send email to Roger von Seeburg including your <u>name, address, phone</u> <u>number and email address using "GN Operations" in the</u> <u>subject line</u>. You will receive some advance material via mail or email. Having had the opportunity to participate in one of these operating sessions, we can both assure you that you will have an enjoyable evening of operations and meet some of the "Empire Builders" in person.

The PSR BOD has agreed to place the PSR membership requirement for attending the PSR Convention on the meeting agenda at the September meeting. This will not change the requirements for this year, but will be a topic of discussion for future events.



Modeling with the Masters

Concept

During several NMRA[®] events participants wanted more than just a "how to clinic." However, this was difficult to provide due to the high number of members attending our programs. The Modeling with the Masters program was developed with a hands-on approach to modeling in mind. By limiting the number of participants to 24 members, placed in small groups, you receive personal instruction by an NMRA[®] Master Model Railroader.

Skill Level

The MWTM Clinics cover topics on an introductory basis but include some techniques that are advanced. Since the whole idea is to teach you new skills by "doing" you will amaze yourself with what you will accomplish.

Program

These clinics provide background on the history of the subject, current available materials, kits, methods of construction and an outline of the hands on projects.

After watching a lesson the participants build a small project based on this lesson material. Our staff of Clark Kooning and Al Boos, both Master Model Railroaders, will be available to assist the participants during the PSR convention.

At the end of each clinic, the participants will have several items to take home. Other MMR's may also drop by to assist.

We will try to accommodate models in your scale; however, this may not be possible due to availability. See the scale availability for each clinic on the facing page. You may choose one or as many clinics as you would like to attend.

Each MWTM clinic you choose will result in an extra fare being charged to you. This extra fare covers all kits, paints and other building materials need to complete an excellent model that you may take home and place on your layout.

NOTES FOR PHOTOGRAPHERS

- 6. Be aware of your surroundings. Where you are standing may interfere with someone else's perfect photograph.
- 7. Always check around you when you are going to stepup to take your photograph. You might be stepping into the line of focus for another photographer.
- 8. Enjoy yourself and get some great shots.

A loop of Sn3 track (1:64) runs in front of the cliffs and has its own 3-track yard on the center peninsula.

About 30% of the layout is scenicked with spectacular cliffs and a detailed coalmine. An ore dock serves a Great Lakes ore ship. Various structures, including an ice dock serve the PFE reefers and other freight equipment. A large engine facility is under construction.

The MMI&E magical Railroad has approximately 600 feet of track in two separate raised modified dog bones. Most of the locomotive power, both steam and diesel, is LGB with just a sprinkling of Accucraft and a pinch of MTH. The remote control for the railroad is supplied by the LGB multi train system (MTS) with decoders installed in each locomotive. The trains run through so much lush landscaping that you will not believe your are in the desert (lots of shade for viewing). There are half a dozen or more bridges, both wooden and steal, including a replica of the famous New York City Hell Gate Bridge measuring over 18 feet long. Also a pond with water fall and a little Mexican village complete with cactus and a mariachi band that plays music when the train passes by. The trains wind through a shed that later becomes storage area when they are no longer in use. The railroad is always under going changes but is always available for viewing.

A special operating session has been planned for the PSR convention and it will be held on Thursday evening at Jim Knollmiller's Great Northern RR. The operating group at the Great Northern evolved from Ed Ravenscroft's "Skokie Operators", and has developed an operation that includes: Road crews, Local crews, 3 busy Yard crews, a Passenger terminal crew, and a Dispatcher. The RR has operated monthly for the last several years, and has earned the approval of some well-known visting operators such as Gil Freitag and Don Mitchell.

The Great Northern is roughly 62' by 40' and has a linear walk-around mainline run of 500', taking 15 to 20 minutes to cover at scale speeds.

The operating system uses the standard palm-size cardcards and waybills, with "SPin" (or "Clic") location diagrams on the facia. Control is DCC, both tethered and radio; there are no "control panels", so no time is lost trying to decode switch controls.

Regular GN operators will be available to assist if needed, so no operating experience is required, but for those who are experienced, this is a session NOT to be missed!

Operation has been talked about in the model press, and is, in fact, the icing on the cake. Here is your chance for a Great Northern hands-on experience. Attendance is limited to the first 20 who sign up, so don't delay.

The Eagle Ridge Story

Railroading Fun on the Charleston, Eagle Ridge & Wheeling Railroad comes in Big Bytes

he town of Eagle Ridge is a modern town in West Virginia. The industries in Eagle Ridge include the production of plastics, oil and fuel refineries as well as manufacturing. These industries are all served by the CE&W. A few short miles away lies the town of Linoki. This is a reconstructed old town, which brings many tourists to the area.

It all started back in the year 1874, when industry in the area of Eagle Ridge, West Virginia, had grown to such proportions that a better method of getting the products of these industries to market was needed. The nearest railroads were the Baltimore & Ohio, which passed to the north of Eagle Ridge, and the Chesapeake and Ohio, which passed to the south. The owners of the industries in the Eagle Ridge area appealed to both of these railroads for a spur that would serve their needs. At the time the B&O was busy pressing onward to Chicago and the C&O was having financial problems of its own, so neither was in a mood to talk to the handful of industries in the Eagle Ridge area.

"Tubby" Toby Mane was the Proprietor of T. Mane Foods, a food processing plant just outside of Eagle Ridge that is known as Rocky Fork. Tubby wasn't about to be stopped by the lack of interest on the part of the B&O and the C&O. He got together with his good friend "Dandy" Dan Jerris, who was just beginning to make a big boom in the chemical business, and together they formulated a plan. The first step was to call a meeting of all the businessmen in the area that would benefit from a freight hauling railroad service. They held the first meeting at the Olden Brewery, home of Century Beer, the beer that Omar Von Olden hoped would make Eagle Ridge famous. Together they formed the Businessmen's Union to Return Prosperity to Eagle Ridge, also known as the BURPERS.

After a few Centurys (the beer that is), a lively discussion ensued over the direction their new railroad would take. Some were in favor of a northerly course to interchange with the B&O at Wheeling, and others favored a southerly course to interchange with the C&O at Charleston. A few Centurys later (the beer again), 22

the boys became real enthusiastic and decided to build a railroad in both directions.

The BURPERS then set about choosing a name for their new railroad. Because Omar Von Olden was the main stockholder of the new corporation, the name BURPERS & Olden was suggested. However, the majority felt this would cause some confusion with the Baltimore & Ohio Railroad, as both would have B&O as their reporting marks. The name finally chosen, and agreed to by all, was The Eagle Ridge Freight Railway System.

Construction was soon begun on the trackage both north and south, and a site was chosen on the outskirts of Eagle Ridge for the engine facility. The BURPERS began looking forward to a boom in business. T. Mane began taking orders for his food products nationwide, and decided to anticipate the rush by building an annex to his plant. Unable to find anyone that he felt could run the annex, he had himself cloned. He named the clone Cy and put him in charge of the new building. Many years later Cy Clone invented a metal fence that was named after him.

The BURPERS also formed a real estate corporation and called it Tate Realty, after the man who was chosen to run it, Reel S. Tate. Tate Realty set about acquiring as much of the real estate in the area of the E.R.F.R. as was possible. They then sold, leased or rented this property only to industries that guaranteed business to the railroad. Each parcel of land was given its own siding.

Soon after the railroad became operational it caused a monumental growth in the industries using its facilities. This caused a need for a larger work force in many of the local industries. Advertisements were placed in local and nearby newspapers, and the results brought many responses from other towns outside of Eagle Ridge. The railroad began adding a passenger car (purchased, second hand from the B&O) to their morning and evening freight trains to shuttle workers back and forth to their jobs. The workers were given passes to ride free as long as they worked for one of the founding industries.

The E.R.F.R. ran this mixed train for over a year and **PSR Dispatch** — 3rd Quorter, 2003 added cars as necessary. As passenger service became a necessary part of the E.R.F.R. schedule the word freight was dropped from the name of the railroad and for a short time it was known simply as the Eagle Ridge Railroad. In 1877 when the trackage was completed to Charleston and Wheeling, the name was changed again to the Charleston, Eagle Ridge & Wheeling Railroad (CE&W). This name has not been changed since, and though it later became a subsidiary of the Chessie System, it still carried its own name.

The CE&W was marginally successful for many years and served the Eagle Ridge area as it was designed to do. It also began to serve as a bridge line between the C&O and the B&O.

As the automobile became more prevalent, passenger service began to drop off. Even some of the workers who rode free took to driving to work. Passenger scheduling soon was dropped and the mixed train was returned to service to handle the workers who still rode free.

It was during this time of dwindling passenger revenue that "Dandy" Dan Jerris met Honey Devine at the annual Square Dance & Beer Bust. Honey lived several miles north of Eagle Ridge in the little town of Noya. Dan was so taken by the lovely miss from out of town that he took to visiting her almost every day.

But as the railroad found it necessary to cut out passenger service, Dan found himself in somewhat of a dilemma. Being a stockholder of the CE&W, he refused to travel by auto, but would not abandon his visits to his Honey. He called a meeting of the stockholders and said, "Listen, fellas, I'd like to get to Noya." Arrangements were made for Dan to purchase a private car and the railroad agreed to run a special just to Noya whenever Dan wanted to visit Honey. The train became known as the "Justanoya Special."

Eventually, all passenger service was discontinued, with the exception of an occasional special. When the Chessie System came into being they allowed the CE&W to come in under their wing. They were also allowed to retain their own name and continue to serve their original purpose of serving the Eagle Ridge area. The Chessie System obtained the use of the CE&W tracks and Chessie System motive power soon began to appear in the Eagle Ridge area. Chessie diesels and equipment were leased to the CE&W to replace the steam engines that were still operating on the road. The CE&W had purchased a 40-ton General Electric switcher, and an antique box cab diesel to do their yard work, but all roadwork had still been handled by steam. The CE&W still runs steam, but only for tourists and PSR DISPATCH — 3rd Quarter, 2003

rail fan excursions in the Linoki area which has still retained the flavor of the past. A B&O Pacific, in B&O blue, usually serves this purpose. On some occasions the old B&O saddle tanker is saddled up for the job.

In the past year, two retired prospectors, who had given up looking for gold, oil or any other profitable commodity, had taken to producing their own profitable commodity in the nearby hills of Old Eagle Ridge. Business was booming for the Holyor brothers when a stray spark sent the Holyor's Still into oblivion and caused a six-foot excavation where the Holyor's Still had once stood. When the Holyor brothers were able to pick themselves up and survey the damage, t hey discovered that the bottom of the excavation was covered with a substance totally unfamiliar to them. Being old prospectors, the Holyors took a sample of the unknown substance to several "experts" before determining that what they had was unrefined bits and bytes. These were found to be invaluable to the rapidly growing computer industry. Several computer manufacturers and developers immediately expressed interest in this new and untapped supply of bits and bytes. The brothers then began a mining operation known as the Holyor's Byte Mine. They developed a system of hauling the bytes to the IPM refinery by the CE&W in specially built gondolas. They called this method of hauling bytes System 5500 due to the fact that their first 5499 systems were failures. This new industry has added to the revenue of the CE&W and the red high side gondolas lettered System 5500 can be seen daily carrying bytes to the interchange track to be picked up by the Chessie freight.

Another potential boost in freight revenue is expected from the Olden Brewery, which has contracted to produce Old Frothingslosh for local consumption.

Today the CE&W remains a busy little line that still performs its original job of serving the industries in the Eagle Ridge area. The CE&W uses their yard diesels, leased SW1500s and a Baldwin S12, to service the local industries, and shuttle the freight to the interchange track to be picked up by the Chessie System. Chessie fast freights also use CE&W tracks non-stop between Charleston and Wheeling. B&O through passenger service also uses CE&W tracks between these points. An occasional Amtrak special may be seen, as Amtrak also has trackage rights on the CE&W. On weekends the CE&W runs excursion and rail fan trips from Old Eagle Ridge through the mountains and back. Motive power for these trips consists of an ex-B&O Pacific and an ex-B&O Docksider. The passenger cars for these trips are ex-B&O coaches.



egistration for the 2004 PSR Convention will begin at the Arizona Express 2003 Convention. The 2004 PSR Convention & Train Show, Rails to the Verdugos, will be held September 15 to 19, 2004 at the Glendale Hilton Hotel in Glendale, CA. As a special inducement to register at the Arizona Express 2003 Convention in Phoenix an antique railroad brakeman's lantern will be awarded. The lantern, originally from the Nickel Plate railroad, was donated by railroad lantern authority and collector Hilton Beiro. Here is a brief history of the lantern from Mr. Beiro:

The Adlake 300 was introduced by the Adams & Westlake Co. of Chicago in 1930 being the third generation of short globe lanterns.

The first production of the short frame design was the Adlake #200 patented in 1917. With improvements in ventilation, fuel refinement and more heat resistant globes, the new lighter-weight style soon replaced the model "Reliable" Tall globe lantern by 1924 as the standard railroad brakeman's lantern. In 1925, Adlake offered the model #250 in response to Armspear Mfg. Co.'s release of it's 1925 short globe model.

This Adlake 300 was assembled and shipped to the Nickel Plate RR in the first quarter of 1943 as indicated

on the bottom of the lamp. The 300 was produced until 1965 when the U.S. Government legislated the discontinued use of fuel burning lanterns, signal and highway warning devices by public utilities and transportation companies. The New York, Chicago & St. Louis RR (known as the NKP) was purchased by

William Vanderbuilt and consolidated into the New York Central RR at a very inflated price to neutralize the competition.

Note: To retain the lanterns authenticity and future value as a true artifact of railroad history, refrain from electrifying or repainting. The burner and kerosene pot is in an unfired condition.



The lantern is stamped "NKP" on the top and also has the railroad name etched on the red globe. The lantern will be awarded at the annual membership meeting on Sunday, September 14, 2003. All registrations completed at the Arizona Express 2003 PSR Convention are eligible to win the lantern. The lantern will be on display at our registration table at the convention hotel.

In Memorium William Arthur Hoadley 1913 - 2003

Following college, Bill went from the radio repair business to the Army Signal Corps. During World War II he applied his skills in radar systems and long range radio transmitters on Guam. After the war he was a transmitter engineer on Mount Wilson for 21 years and received a Pioneer Broadcasters Award. He retired from television in 1986.

Trains were Bill's favorite hobby. He joined the Glendale Model Railroad Club in 1973 along with his son Hal. Together they chaired the 1989 Torrance PSR Convention. Bill and Winifred were active participants in Los Angeles Division activities. Bill's Super Chief made a final run at his club following his Memorial Services. He will be lovingly remembered by his family and members of the Pacific Southwest Region and the National Model Railroad Association.
