s we come to the close of another year and begin planning for 2004 we have some notable accomplishments within the Division. Last year we began collaborating with Let's Talk Trains (www. letstalktrains.us) who maintain a web radio broadcast on the vast subject of trains in general. The local NMRA® was given an half hour each Saturday morning to speak to the Model Railroading aspect of the subject. Thanks to dozens of volunteers we had speakers interviewed on everything from modeling scenery to the structure of the NMRA®, local clubs and other organizations, and dozens of modeling techniques. Although the subject has not been totally exhausted (so far we've arranged 36 shows), we are going to put it into hiatus until more modelers can be enlisted. You do not have to be in the San Diego area to participate - it is done over the phone. (Contact me if interested). Along with TV and newspaper interviews we had wide media exposure this past year.

As reported previously, we expanded our newsletter and postcard reminders, nearly doubling our circulation which in turn nearly doubled participation at local Meets, mini-tours and other functions. The Mini-tours (once a month) have proven to be real crowd pleasers. Some of the tours include clinics and short business meetings to introduce newcomers to the operation and purpose of the Division. Several new tours and new members were a direct result of this campaign.

Plans for 2004 will continue to develop the Mini-tour concept and to improve our exposure to local clubs and RR organizations. We established a Club Liaison position who will be responsible for coordinating events with local clubs and keeping them appraised of the Division and how we can interface. Another goal is to host clinics at several area hobby shops in order to to provide a service to both the beginner and the serious hobbyist while maintaining a good rapport with the hobby stores (who are often undercut by the discount warehouses). By re-constituting planned Road Trips we also hope to broaden our appeal to include the railfan. We will also be encouraging and supporting efforts at the Antique Steam & Gas Engine Museum who have established a permanent north county RR exhibit and library (a modular building is being installed as this is written).

With a full time Publicity Chairman, Clinic Chairman and Club Liaison, along with other plans, we look forward to an even more successful year in 2004.

OW! The convention was a success. The doors opened on time and nearly all of the activities happened as planned. We had a great time and received many favorable comments on clinics, layout tours, Modeling With the Masters, the Chinese Auction, the hotel and the fact that the convention took place. This was very gratifying.

There were a total of 153 registrants (net) who attended. There were a number of cancellations for various reasons. We met the hotel's room night requirements. At the time of writing this article, we believe that the convention is in the black.

The model and photography contests were well populated with entries; the full results are available in this issue of the *PSR Dispatch*.

There were some things that were canceled for various reasons. One clinic was canceled and two or three others the clinician failed to show up for one session. The shuttle bus to the swap meet was canceled because there was insufficient interest in advance and it was a very expensive offering. The Railette tour to the chocolate factory was canceled because there was not enough people to meet the chocolate factory minimum requirement. All in all, the transportation was a bust. There just was not enough interest to cover the expenses.

A full written report will be presented to the PSR Board of Directors (BOD) at a future date.



In the ensuing eight years I've had a lot of fun creating each issue and I've had the pleasure of working with many fine individuals, too numerous a list to print here, so I'll just use this article to say "**Thank You Very Much!**" to all of you.

As a Life Member of the PSR and the NMRA® I'll continue to attend Arizona Division meets and the occasional PSR convention but now I'll just be a POM (Plain Ordinary Member). Bill joined the NMRA in the mid-1940s as member #0748, becoming a Life Member in 1946. He also was member #1689 of the PSR and member #057 of the Thunderbird Model Railroad Club of Phoenix since 1971. He served on the Board of Directors of this club and as Vice President and President.

Model Railroading was an enormous part of Bill's life, both in New York and Arizona. The model railroads in his homes on Long Island and in Tempe were gathering places where model railroaders would meet, run their model equipment, and socialize. While living in the Phoenix area, he worked in hobby shops and had his own shop – Bill's Caboose.

Bill was a member of the Pennsylvania Railroad Technical & Historical Society, the Arizona and Philadelphia Chapters of the PRRT&HS, the Arizona Railway Museum, the National Railway Historical Society and the NRHS Long Island Sunrise Chapter.

Bill is survived by his wife Betty, his son William Jr., daughters Nancy and Deborah and four grandchildren.

his copy of the *PSR Dispatch* contains a "Convention Registration Status Survey from the PSR Board of Directors" in which the PSR Board of Directors (BOD) is seeking your opinion on an important question that concerns the general membership.

Last year the BOD made a decision that everyone attending the PSR Annual Convention must be an NMRA® member. The consequence of this decision created much dissension amongst members within the Region and especially within the Arizona Division.

Because of the difficulties experienced, the PSR Board is revisiting this issue and seeks your input to make a decision that will be in the best interest of all. It is their desire not to have this issue become divisive for any of its Divisions and members.

Originally there were major NMRA® insurance issues that weighed heavily upon the Board's initial decision to implement the membership requirement policy at the Annual Convention. The insurance issue has been clarified and is no longer a factor in this matter.

Generally, the PSR Board feels there should be visible benefits to NMRA[®] members when they attend the PSR Annual Convention. To provide this benefit, an additional charge of \$10 to \$20 is being proposed for non-members wishing to attend. Each Convention Committee would determine the actual amount of the premium within that range.

Proponents in favor of allowing non-members to attend by paying a surcharge contend that the Convention is ideal event to expose and educate non-members to all that we do as members and provide an experience that allows non-members to want to join rather than be required to join.

What is your opinion? Should the PSR Board change current policies in order that everyone expressing interest be allowed to attend our Convention?

The 2004 Convention Logo

ur logo represents all the railroads that have served the Glendale, California area. The logo shows the Verdugo Mountains, named for Corporal Jose Maria Verdugo, the original land grant owner. The mountains rise 2,300 feet above the central part of Glendale. The building represents the "Casa Verdugo" - the original was a ranch house in the original Spanish land grant in 1798. In 1904 the Los Angeles Interurban Railway Co.(part of the Pacific Electric) acquired the ruins of the original building and restored it as a restaurant and called it the "Casa Verdugo." The Pacific Electric then extended their track up Brand Blvd. to the restaurant, which became a popular tourist attraction. The Casa Verdugo was located only one block north of our convention hotel. The site is now a public library named the Casa Verdugo Branch. By the way, the convention hotel, The Glendale Hilton, is located on top of the former Pacific Electric R/W that served Burbank, CA.

The first railroad in Glendale was the Southern

Pacific, which was built in 1874. The first depot wasn't built until 1888



and that was in the community of Tropico, located just south of Glendale. In those days the depot was used for the transportation of strawberries which were grown by local Japanese settlers. The Community of Tropico was annexed into the City of Glendale and the present station built in 1924.

The second railroad to operate in Glendale was the Pacific Electric, which ran from 1904 until 1955.


The next railroad built in Glendale was the Glendale & Eagle Rock in 1909. After four years of operation this traction line was incorporated into the Glendale & Montrose Railroad. This line lasted until 1930.

Other railroads that have served and continue to operate in Glendale are the Union Pacific, Amtrak and Metrolink. Today the Glendale station is very busy with over 100 trains using it each weekday.



nother great PSR convention has come and gone. It is always a very nice experience to be reunited with old friends and to meet new people with the hope that they will also become old friends. We sometimes forget that the best reason for joining the NMRA® and PSR and actively participating is because of the camaraderie, the sharing of common interests with others.

With regard to the convention contest room this year there is good news and bad news. The good news is that there were 42 entries in the photo contests with some really high quality inputs; there were five entries in the arts and crafts contests, the most ever in a PSR contest, and there were 34 entries in the model contest, 32 for judging and





two for the popular vote "favorite model" contest only. This was an excellent turn out considering there was only a single entry in arts and crafts and three entries less in the model contest than at Oceanside last year.

The bad news – a single person submitted all five entries in the arts and crafts contests (Ed. - and none displayed a railroad theme). Although the entries were of excellent quality, it would've been nice to see more entries and the concomitant higher level of competition. In the model contest only 14 people submitted the 34 contest entries. Wouldn't it have been wonderful to have seen 34 people submitting entries? This comment is not intended to discourage multiple contest entries but to express a desire to encourage a broader participation base.

Clearing Up "Open" vs. "Kit"

While entering model construction contest categories, Open or Kit, is the decision of the contestant, there appears to be some confusion regarding this issue.

The "Open" category is for models that are more than 50% scratchbuilt or are deemed, by the entering contestant, to have significant modifications and/or a quantity of added details to warrant being judged in the Open contest.

The "Kit" is intended to provide a competition class for kit models upon which the modeler has made improvements and has added details or made modifications and are judged in the kit contest.

Those who have built models from basic kits, as a starting point, should give first consideration to entering the kit contest, not the open, unless major (with emphasis on major) modifications and detailing has been accomplished. Look to an analogy in the old saying, "Never bring a knife to a gunfight".

Competition... a Dirty Word?

JUDGING from the ever declining number of entries in local, regional and national model railroad contests, it would appear that the concept of competition is rapidly losing



its viability in our hobby. I find this extremely troubling.

I just returned from the annual convention of the NMRA's Rocky Mountain Region, where I had a really enjoyable time. It was held in Pueblo, Colorado, this year, and provided opportunities to see a number of great layouts, including Fred Carlson's Gladstone & North Houghton (Nov/Dec 2000) ... and others that I hope to feature in future issues. Everything about the convention was super. .. the clinics, banquet and hobo breakfast, the railfanning, the train show ... everything that is, except the contest room.

Now don't get me wrong, there were some nice models ... but there were only SEVEN entries - three in the diesel/other motive power category (one was a railcar), and only one freight car and three structures. I can't remember a regional contest with so few entries. There wasn't a single steam engine ... or even a road diesel for that matter. .. no passenger cars ... or cabooses ... or MoW...or a single diorama. There was no N scale, no S scale, no 0 scale, no G scale ... and only two narrow gauge entries. And this is the Rocky Mountain Region? I could hardly believe what I didn't see.

It is not my intention to pick on the RMR; this type of poor showing has affected most areas. But why is this problem growing? First off, let's get rid of the notion of "the" reason; the reasons are many, and several are worth mentioning. Many of the reasons modelers choose not to compete in contests have been with us since the birth of our hobby, so let's move past them quickly:

1) There have always been modelers who have dominated contests. While some modelers have been discouraged because they felt they could never compete with (insert name here), others have used that person as a benchmark for excellence.

- 2) There have always been those who object to how the judging is done. The perfect way to judge a modeling contest will probably never be found.
- 3) There have always been other demands on our time. While there are more these days, the choice is still ours to make on how we are going to use our free time.

With these classic reasons behind us, I'd like to address what I believe are two new reasons. The first is societal, and the second is pragmatic. I see a growing trend in our schools, and society in general, that shuns personal excellence and encourages mediocrity. Our competitive nature is giving way to the fear of hurting someone's feelings. Rather than encouraging and rewarding excellence, there is an ever-increasing trend to eliminate competition. Schools have multiple valedictorians (or none at all) ... and even sporting events where there are no winners or losers. After all, if you don't compete you can't lose, right? Or do you just automatically lose?

While society seems to increasingly encourage personal mediocrity, it has, on the other hand, demanded perfection in the products we buy. Society has seemingly concluded that products should make up for our shortfalls. If you question that, just think about all of the lawsuits against automakers that blame a design or manufacturing flaw rather than the reckless or "mediocre" skills of the driver. A side effect of this demand has been commercial models of truly exquisite beauty and complexity. But the downside is that many modelers have decided it is impractical to build their own model when they can just lay out a few (or quite a few) bucks for a ready-to-run version. We are no longer just competing against fellow modelers; we're also competing against the standards set by commercial products. Unfortunately, fewer modelers are willing to put their efforts to the test. And because of that I believe we all suffer.

So what's your reason for not competing?



Book Review "Planning & Executing A Regional Convention" Author: Roger C. von Seeburg DORR ALTIZER, EDITOR

s the author says in the opening sentences of the Introduction, "The responsibility of planning and executing a regional NMRA® convention can be overwhelming. It doesn't have to be that way." In the ensuring 34 pages, plus appendices, Mr. von Seeburg explains (and shares his considered opinions) in clear, concise language exactly how to plan and execute a successful (and fun!) convention. He takes pains to apologize for those opinions, but the book would be much less useful, and not nearly as enjoyable reading, if those opinions were left out.

The whole process is laid out in a very smooth, easy to follow format. The author discusses every conceivable topic from "Where to Start" through the responsibilities of convention committee members to the preparation of a final report for use by future convention planners.

The 16 page section titled "Convention Chairmen" is the heart of the book and goes into great detail about each committee position, including ideas on how each position interacts with other committee members. But my favorite section of the book is titled "Other Items to Watch." Those 10 pages are jam packed full of useful information, insightful tips and, yes, opinions. I've read and reread those pages several times, learning something new on each rereading.

One key point that the author reiterates in several places is that planning a successful (and profitable) convention must be considered a business venture. Doing otherwise puts the whole process on a direct route to a major train wreck and this book will go a long way towards preventing such a wreck from ruining the experience for everyone.

In *my* considered opinion, the appendices alone are worth the price of the book. Included are templates for a budget and the entire planning process plus ten pages of charts and tables (labeled "Historical Data") of information from past conventions that will answer questions that many convention committee members won't even know they have.

The book is only available directly from the author at 309 E. Beck Lane, Phoenix, AZ 85022-3009. The cost is \$12 plus \$2.50 shipping/handling per copy. **The bottom line:** If you're involved in planning a convention, or might do so in the future, *buy this book now!*
