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

Here in the Phoenix valley, the nice spring weather has given away to the summer heat as we get into June. For me that means less outdoor activities and more time to work on the railroad. As we get into summer, the threat for wildfires is increasing as we have seen already. Hopefully all of our members will be safe through the fire season.

The Arizona Division Saturday Zoom meets continued in April and May, including a double header in April! Many of you probably know or have heard of Duane Richardson MMR from his weathering and other clinics he frequently provides at National Conventions. We were treated to a video of his weathering clinic entitled "It Ain't Finished Until It's Dirty" which talks about the ways weathering occurs in nature and how to apply this when weathering your models. The following Saturday we had Duane live on Zoom to answer questions and give a few demonstrations on the techniques he uses to achieve the results discussed in the video. I have attended Duane's clinic previously, and I still learned more sitting through it again.

The clinic in our May Zoom meet was a presentation by Bruce Petrarca MMR describing the development processes he used to design and build his current garden railroad. The challenges he encountered apply to nearly any model railroad, like tradeoffs of the areas you want to include in your railroad, selectively reducing theses area to fit in your layout area, and operating trains with less than scale distances between stations. I found it very interesting, having recently designed the railroad I am currently building. The effort to work through issues and get a design that works for your vision is personal to each railroad, but is a common experience many of us can relate to.

Our sub-division mini meets are continuing. In mid-March, the High Country sub-division met in Kingman in northwest Arizona on Route 66. The meet included a visit to retired UPRR engineer Jim Krause's model railroad, followed by lunch at a diner on Route 66. I wish I could have made the trip; it sounds like a great time for all. The Phoenix East Valley got an opportunity to visit the impressive layout of David Doiron at the end of March. David's Lost Dutchman layout encompasses the entirety of his sizeable basement. I've been fortunate to be on the operating roster for the last few years on this layout, and there is always a load of action during an op session. The Phoenix West Valley was hosted by Bob Ginger MMR to see his excellent N scale layout after enjoying a delicious lunch and some great fellowship with a crew of model railroaders.

The Arizona in-person summer meet is taking place on June 29 in Prescott. All of us from the Phoenix and Tucson areas look forward to a break from the summer heat when we head up to the high country for the summer meeting. By the time this is published the meeting will have taken place, so I hope many of our members are able to attend.

With the hot weather in place, I have been spending more time working on my layout in the past several weeks. Since March, I have been working on the track for my engine terminal area. I installed all of the turnouts leading to the turntable, arrival / departure track, and the terminal support areas. At this point I got the turntable permanently installed. Then I had to dig out the tools to build more turnouts, which were completed and installed for the four yard tracks I have. I've been tweaking the final locations for a three stall roundhouse, a car shop, a sand house, fuel terminal, and a power plant. With all of that firmed up, I can finish the track to those buildings and get it wired up.

The SurfLiner 2024 is right around the corner, and I hope to see all of you in Long Beach. There are lots of awesome tours, both prototype and general interest, along with tons of clinics and layout tours. The week wraps up with the National Train Show and the Awards Banquet. It's a great opportunity to get to a national convention without having to travel outside of our Region!


San Diego

June, 2024, Shotgun Tom Kelly's model railroad layout tour (picture left). All model railroads have unique designs and features. One of the most unusual features of Tom's railroad is the entire model railroad layout moves up and down and is stored near the ceiling. The layout includes a city with multiple businesses including a barber shop, a radio and television, a movie theater, a mountain for the TV station's tower and transmitter, a tobacco shop, a warehouse, city office buildings, several billboards

advertising Shotgun as a radio announcer, a pool hall, a water tower, a city hall, a city apartment building, a Santa Fe train station, industrial areas and more.



July 13, 2024, Layout Tour with John Vavra. John has a wheelchair accessible HO/HOn3 model railroad, called the Santa Fe Lines, and the era is 1994. The location of the railroad is loosely based in Arizona and Colorado, USA. The cities modeled on the layout are Flagstaff, Arizona and then going northeast, he models the cities of Durango and then Silverton which are both located in Colorado. The standard gauge portion of John's railroad is based on the Atchison, Topeka and Santa Fe and the narrow gauge railroad is loosely based on the Durango and Silverton Narrow Gauge Railroad (D&SNG). John is a very skilled modeler and has been published in model railroad magazines including Model Railroader.

Preparations for The 2026 PSR convention in San Diego: Preparations are proceeding with a hotel having been selected in San Diego's Mission Valley, and a contract has been signed with the Hotel.

New Superintendent for the San Diego Division has been selected: Following a unanimous vote at the Spring Meet on May 11, 2024, Don Fowler was elected to the position of Superintendent. 2024 PSR Awards Second Quarter

The second quarter had little activity, I think in part to the upcoming National Convention which is taking a lot of member's time.

Here are the AP Certificates issued for the second quarter of 2024.

Although it is not my area of responsibility, I do work closely with Mike Allee the Show Room Manager on monitoring the AP Merit awards. And unfortunately, we still have evaluating happening that is not in line with the NMRA standards. Remember it only takes 87.5 point to get a Merit Award and that is equal to "C" average work. As evaluators we need to be sure we evaluate each and every model correctly.

First is Construction. How well is the model built? This is Construction only. Are corners nicely fitted, is roofing done correctly, any glue spots, basically how well was the item built. And yes, there can be some things that are done incorrectly, but you as an evaluator have to look at the model as a completed item and just how much did the mistake detract from the finished product.

Detail. Just how well was the model detailed and what was added to make the model exceptional. Yes, this can be a kit that has been kit bashed or a

lot of additional details added. And if scratch built most of it is details added.

Conformity. This is one that often gets graded wrong. The modeler needs to provide you some documentation on the item they built but do not expect the model to be an exact copy of the photo or other documentation. Simply, it does not have to be an exact copy but a representation of the documentation.

Finish and lettering. What we are looking for in this category is did the modeler finish the item in a prototypical manner. If it is something that should have been painted and how well was it painted? But remember, it could be an old dilapidated item so the paint will be well weathered. It can be a wood trestle so do not expect any lettering and, if not new, it should be weathered accordingly and should get points reflecting that work.

Scratch Built. This is straight forward if completely scratch built no issues. It gets the points if some commercial parts are used but you are limited to 10-point max. This has nothing to do with construction quality as that is addressed in construction.

So, we as evaluators are walking a thin line and it is not our job to discourage a new modeler but instead give feedback on what was done wrong and some positive feedback on what was done well. Just think back to the first few models you built and be honest. I am sure you thought they were perfect. This is a hobby that gives us an opportunity to share what we have learned over the years and help new members become better model builders. Nothing is gained by being over critical. In fact, it sometimes causes members to rethink their membership and involvement in the NMRA.

During the period March 22, 2024, through June 30, 2024, there were several PSR financial transactions, both deposits and credits.

On the expense side, National Membership Rebates to the Divisions totaling \$1,039 were cashed and a check for \$99.00 reimbursement to John McGreevy for the cost of ElectionBuddy for the PSR President Election was cut. Additionally, payments were made to InMotion Hosting in the amount of \$143.88 for Division and Region Website Hosting (4 x \$35.97).


The on-line Bank Statement indicates that the Region had \$30,623.69 on 6/30/2024.


A Visit to the Slim Gauge Guild Model Railroad Club by Vic Cavalli

One of the many "self-drive" model railroad layouts that will be available for viewing during the National Model Railroad Associate's Annual Convention, SurfLiner 2024, August 4th-11th is the Slim Gauge Guild. (Consult your Convention packet's Timetable for specific date(s) and time(s) the club will be open.)

On June 2nd, during one of their twice-annual open houses, I had an opportunity to view not their one but two expertly built layouts. The slightly larger of the two is in HOn3, the other in Sn3. Both are housed together in a 2,000 square foot basement.

The HOn3 layout is heavily influenced by the Denver and Rio Grande Western and the Rio Grande Southern railroads, and strives to model specific prototype scenes as accurately as possible. There are also areas of mixed standard and narrow gauge trackage; for example, Salida, CO. A feature I found interesting was the layout's "lower" height. I'm guessing maybe 44-46 inches off the floor? When asked, a club member shared it was intentional -- "it makes it easier for children to view the trains."

The Sn3 layout is a bit more freelanced in nature. I was told it is meant to loosely reflect the character of the Colorado and Southern Railroad, though what I saw during my visit was mostly D&RGW and RGS equipment running. There is also a "high line" branch, towering over eye-level, some 68-72 inches above floor level, with reflects northern California's lumber region and practices. My tour guide was proud to point out that all track work on the Sn3 layout is hand laid.

Both layouts, however, follow a similar track planning style: busy rail yards venture out onto vast open landscape, where single track mainlines double back upon themselves to gain elevation only to eventually find it necessary to traverse tall, vertical mountains – some in excess of 7 feet high – either by following a canyon's water route or crossing over on spidery wooden trestles. Regardless, the attention to detail is exceptional.

Frequently working from historic photographs, the Guild's members strive to recreate everything down to the smallest detail; resulting in very realistic looking rock work and simply awesome water effects. There's even one river that flows in both directions?!?!, though you'd never know it unless someone pointed it out to you.

To summarize my visit, whether viewing the HOn3 or Sn3 layout, you will be treated to finely detailed, weathered locomotives (most with sound) smoothly working their trains at scale speeds through spectacular scenery everywhere you look. And, all presented by some of the nicest, friendliest people you'll ever meet.
