From the Brass Hat

This is my first Brass Hat column as President of the Pacific Southwest Region of the NMRA, and I want to thank the membership for allowing me to serve the organization in this way. I appreciate the importance of this position and hope to serve effectively as your President. I also want to thank Pat Raymer for his terrific leadership over his term as President, along with outgoing Vice President, Gary Butts, MMR. We have some big shoes to fill. Let me welcome our new newly elected Vice President, Frank Kenny and our newly appointed Treasurer, John McGreevy, as well as newly appointed Karie Neely as Plus -One Chair and Brian Neely as newly appointed Region Historian, to the Board and thank the PSR Board of Directors and Committee Chairs for their ongoing commitment. Ι have asked all the current Committee Chairs to continue their service that began under Pat.

I've been using "From the Brass Hat" column name since I began serving as the Cajon Division about 5 years ago, so I thought I would continue using it here. This column provides me with the opportunity to reach the entire PSR membership and as you'll learn, my columns tend to be about many different topics, ranging from my current modeling efforts to ideas about membership and service to the organization.

Over the years, I have met quite a few of the PSR members in all four Divisions, but I suspect that I'm not a household name in the Region, so I want to use this first column to tell you a little bit about me, my model railroading journey, and my goals as PSR President.

I arrived in southern California in June of 1982 after driving cross-country in my packed 1977 Pontiac Ventura, with a college degree in Geography and Environmental Studies, a short work history in various sales jobs and a 5-string banjo. There were no trains in the car (I had abandoned the hobby after high school). My dad and I began model railroading together in my early teens, when we purchased an N scale Atlas train set in 1971 (I still have the 0-4-0 with slope back tender). I mention this because I've come to recognize that a lot of my enjoyment of model railroading is the social aspect is due to the pleasant memories of hanging out doing trains with my dad working on the railroad. Don't get me wrong, I can sit for hours and work on a structure, scenery or whatever, alone, but I really enjoy sharing the hobby with others who have the same passion for model railroading.

I had lost interest in model railroading and trains during my college years, even though I went to college in Oneonta, NY (D&H Division Point) and Buffalo (railroad heaven). In fact, I may never have gotten back into the hobby if it wasn't for a serendipitously placed copy of Model Railroader Magazine, which I stumbled onto in 1984 while I was working as an inhome salesman. While waiting for the prospect to bring in his wife, I noticed a copy of the magazine on the coffee table next to the sofa. I looked at the cover and said to myself, "I used to be interested in that". I picked it up, leafed through it and said to myself, "Hmm, I'm still interested in this!" (I'd like to thank that prospect!) A few days later, I went to Arnie's Trains, bought the Campbell Ten Stamp Mill kit (Nscale), bought some foam and scenery materials and built a small diorama. I was hooked again! It was during this period that I met my future wife Dee, and my step-daughters Stephanie and Denise. While not particularly interested in the hobby, Dee and the family have been dealing with my commitment to the hobby ever since.

Over the next few years we moved several times, and I built (but never completed) several layouts, while working as a County Land Development Planner, partnering with Dee in her small business called Dee's Windshield Repair, and in late 1999, beginning my career with T&B Planning, Inc., as a land planning and development consultant. I've now been with T&B for 24 years (as a Principal and partner for 20 years) and will be fully retiring in December 2024.

In 1995, we purchased a beautifully finished 2-car garage with an attached house in West Garden Grove and I started the design and construction of my current 125 -square foot N-scale operations-oriented New York, Ontario and Western Railway, California Division layout. We have been operating every other month since 2013, with the layout evolving all the time thanks to

the assistance of the regular operating crew (with special thanks to the new PSR VP). You may have seen the layout featured in the January 2024 edition of the NMRA Magazine or visited during any of the open houses or the most recent Layout Tours associated with the SurfLiner2024 National Convention. If you would like to get a private tour of the layout or attend an operating session, please email me to arrange it. In addition to model railroading, I also play bluegrass banjo and am a voracious reader of techno-thrillers, mysteries of all kinds and military history. Dee and I are still married, the girls are married, and both live nearby. We also have one 16-year-old grand-daughter, Kodi.

I've been an adult member of the NMRA since 2011 and my commitment to the NMRA grew over the next few years. I accepted the appointment as the Cajon Division Paymaster/Chief Clerk in December 2016 and served in that position until elected Cajon Division Superintendent in December 2019 (I will continue as Superintendent until December 2024). Also in 2019, I was appointed CFO/Treasurer of the PSR and have been serving in that position until becoming PSR President in August of 2024. Additionally, I have been serving as Treasurer and Co-Chairman of the SurfLiner2024 National Convention since 2022 and will continue to serve as Treasurer until the books are closed in a couple of months. Finally, I served on the 2017 and 2021 PSR Regional Convention Committees, presented clinics in both (as well as at the SurfLiner2024) and attended the National Conventions in Kansas City in 2018 and in St. Louis in 2022.

So that's my story, and I'm sticking to it. But why do I feel it was important to tell you all this? There are several reasons.

First, the recitation of my positions within the NMRA is not to infer that I'm anything special in this organization; you probably know other members with a much longer list of accomplishments and contributions to their Division, PSR and the NMRA than mine. Instead, I tell you about it to demonstrate one of the primary messages of my tenure as Cajon Superintendent, and a message I will continue to send as President of the PSR: my belief that you will get out of this organization in direct proportion to what you put into the organization. The more involved you are with an organization, the more benefits you will enjoy from that organization, and the more valuable your membership becomes. I guarantee that if you ask the members, you know who have served as officers, committee chairs or otherwise made a strong commitment to the organization, if they felt doing so enhanced their enjoyment and value of their membership, they will say that it did.

Therefore, I strongly encourage each of you to make a personal commitment to increase your participation to the greatest extent possible, make participating in Division and Regional events a priority, not an afterthought. Plan to attend the on-line and live events by putting them on your calendar, write a few articles, host an open house, or simply show up in support of those members organizing the events. The more you do, the greater the value you will get from your membership. If you do nothing, you will get nothing. I recognize that not everyone wants the responsibility of, or can make the commitment needed to be an officer or committee chair of a Division or the PSR. It's certainly easier to sit on the sidelines and participate in the events that they make possible. But if you have the skill set needed to take on one of the leadership positions effectively, I urge you to make the commitment to take on that important role. If not you, who?

Second, I believe my background of family, work and other interests illustrates the wonderful reality that we all come to this hobby with different stories, skills and interests, yet we share a passion for model railroading and enjoy sharing that passion with each other. Those of you who have met me know that soon after we meet, I will ask what you do/did for a living (I'm always fascinated with the variety) and what you are interested in within the hobby, to see where our interests intersect. And I've never met a model railroader or NMRA member who wasn't happy to help with me in any way they could. What a fantastic resource we all can be to each other!

Ramblings from the Caboose

Hello, my name is Frank Kenny and I've recently been elected as the Region Vice President. I'm sure everything you need to know about what has gone on, and what is going to occur in the Region will be posted throughout this issue so instead of a recap, I'll introduce myself.

I've been a model railroader since the early 70's but was a train-a-holic from birth according to my parents. The National Train Show had a much smaller footprint than normal, but there were still a significant number of vendors and manufacturers in attendance. 

The Era, Cities and the Railroad: The part of the Rio Grande Southern that Chuck models includes the towns of Ridgway, Placerville, Ophir and Rico, Colorado. There are multiple types of structures and these structures are based on prototype pictures from railroad history books. There are also mountain ranges, rivers, creeks, lakes, trestles, trees and other scenery on the model railroad.

NMRA NATIONAL SURFLINER CONVENTION

I had the pleasure of attending the Surfliner Convention in August. It was my first National Convention. I primarily worked with the audio visual team for the clinics. This also gave me an opportunity to attend a lot of clinics. I also gave a clinic myself regarding rebuilding an old engine such as an Athearn Blue Box. I demonstrated how to do a stall test on the motor of the engine with a recommendation to replace any open face motors with a new can motor. I also provided tips on cleaning and lubing the engine and installation of a DCC decoder. I have noticed that there are a lot of model railroaders that don't work on their own engines which is a part of the hobby that I find to be quite rewarding. It was fun to do a clinic and I also learned things from suggestions provided by the attendees.

Of the clinics that I attended, one of the most notable was on how to present a clinic. One of the important tips provided was to limit the amount of text on your power point slides. It is not important to get every concept regarding a topic onto one slide. Too much text can be distracting to the viewer. It is better to add another slide rather than make your audience read and try to pay attention to you at the same time.

Another clinic/presentation that I liked was a live zoom conference with the repair crew of the Durango and Silverton Tourist Railroad. The presentation started with a movie that provided an overview of the Durango and Silverton shops. After that we were able to ask questions of the crew regarding the railroad and the repair projects. It was

an aspect of this world famous tourist railroad that none of us had ever experienced before.

I also enjoyed a clinic given by an engineer who formerly worked for the Southern Pacific. He was an excellent speaker and he provided a lot of details of the daily tasks he performed shunting cars around the L.A. Basin. He used yard diagrams to demonstrate the tasks of moving cars to a yard and putting a train together to deliver cars throughout the L.A. area. It appears that the work requires one to be available at all hours of the day.

I recommend that you attend a national convention and take advantage of the rich selection of clinics offered. The experience will give you further background in model railroading and provide inspiration for your work on your own layout.

PACIFIC SOUTHWEST REGION 37 TREASURERS FALL DISPATCH REPORT

John McGreevy/Joel Morse - Treasurers

SUMMARY:

John McGreevy is now PSR Treasurer, however, the transition from Joel Morse to John McGreevy is still incomplete, and this report is a combined effort to provide this information during the transition period.

During the period June 30, 2024, through August 31, 2024, there were several PSR financial transactions this period, consisting only of expenses.

With the Board's approval, the Region engaged Cabrillo Compliance to assist in preparing tax returns for 2023 and setting up the PSR's Chart of Accounts for future tax years with a deposit of \$3,000.00 of the total agreement amount of \$5,590.00. The need for this service arises from the consolidation of the finances as a single corporation, which resulted in the need to file more complex Federal tax forms than previously required. Payment of the full agreement amount will be split between the Divisions and the Region by holding back three National Division Membership Rebates (to assure contribution in proportion to membership), with the Region paying the balance. Additional expenses included payments made to InMotion Web Hosting in the amount of \$35.97 for Division hosting, \$99.00 for Election Buddy reimbursement cashed in this period, \$86.62 for Hobo Breakfast prizes at the SurfLiner2024 and \$65.14 for the purchase of two collapsable PA speaker stands, one for the Region and one for the Cajon Division. The Cajon Division will be reimbursing the Region for their cost (\$32.57).

No deposits were made during this period. Total expenses this period: \$3,286.73

The on-line Bank Statement indicates that the Region had \$27,336.96 on 8/21/2024.
